Christ has promised to remain beside us during life if only we stay close to him. While we remain healthy branches of the vine, Christ, we will be on the road to



heaven. Our daily tasks, our work as well as our prayer, our joys as well as our sorrows, will give glory to God and prove that we are worthy to be called disciples of Christ.

Today's Good News

The **first reading** taken from the Acts of the Apostles 9:26-31 is about St. Paul's first visit to Jerusalem after his conversion.

The **second reading** is from the first Letter of John 3:18-24. In today's verses the Beloved Disciple is urging his readers to believe firmly in Jesus Christ the Son of God, and to love their neighbor with a practical love, a love which will help him in his corporal and spiritual needs.

The **Gospel** is from St. John 15:1-8. The words of consolation and encouragement which our Lord spoke to his Apostles on Holy Thursday night were intended to console and encourage all his followers for all time. They encourage and console us today, and we need encouragement to persevere on the road to heaven. Living a truly Christian life is never easy. We have always the attraction of the world, and the temptations by the agents of evil, to make that life less easy still. But in our own day these difficulties have increased a hundredfold. The attractions of this world have been multiplied by the increased comforts, pleasures and means of self-indulgence which science and technology have put within our reach. Human nature, always inclined to choose the easiest way out, has been given so many means of escape from the strain of self-control that even for a fervent Christian it is frequently very difficult to avoid these worldly allurements.

It is indeed hard to swim against the current; it is so much more pleasant to allow oneself to be carried along without effort by the rushing tide. But when there are rocks and shoals ahead, the thoughtless and ease-seeking swimmer will end in grief. Our Lord has warned us today, as he warned his first followers, to abide in him, to remain closely united with him, as is the branch to the vine, if we hope to bear fruit worthy of heaven. He promises us that if we remain closely united to him, that is, if we strive daily to keep his commandments, he will be ever ready to answer our requests, and to heed all our prayers. The sincere prayer today of every man who is trying to lead a Christian life is for the grace to overcome the allurements of the world, the flesh and the devil. Let us take courage, then.



St Joseph the Worker May 1st

The feast of St. Joseph the Worker was established by Pope Pius XII in 1955 in order to Christianize the concept of labor and give to all workmen a model and a protector.



By the daily labor in his shop, offered to God with patience and joy, St. Joseph provided for the necessities of his holy spouse and of the Incarnate Son of God, and thus became an example to all laborers.

"Workmen and all those laboring in conditions of poverty will have reasons to rejoice rather than grieve, since they have in common with the Holy Family daily preoccupations and cares" (Leo XIII). Memorial of St. Catherine of Siena, Virgin and Doctor of the Church April 29th



Catherine, the youngest of twenty-five children, was born in Siena on March 25, 1347. During her youth she had to contend with great difficulties on the part of her parents. They were planning

marriage for their favorite daughter; but Catherine, who at the age of seven had already taken a vow of virginity, refused. To break her resistance, her beautiful golden brown tresses were shorn to the very skin and she was forced to do the most menial tasks. Undone by her patience, mother and father finally relented and their child entered the Third Order of St. Dominic.

Unbelievable were her austerities, her miracles, her ecstasies. The reputation of her sanctity soon spread abroad; thousands came to see her, to be converted by her. The priests associated with her, having received extraordinary faculties of absolution, were unable to accommodate the crowds of penitents. She was a helper and a consoler in every need. As time went on, her influence reached out to secular and ecclesiastical matters. She made peace between worldly princes. The heads of Church and State bowed to her words.

She weaned Italy away from an anti-pope, and made cardinals and princes promise allegiance to the rightful pontiff. She journeyed to Avignon and persuaded Pope Gregory XI to return to Rome. Even though she barely reached the age of thirty-three her accomplishments place her among the great women of the Middle Ages. The virgin Catherine was espoused to Christ by a precious nuptial ring which, although visible only to her, always remained on her finger.

Simple Laws

There are a lot of laws. Our national constitution is long. Every state, county and

municipality has additional rules and regulations. Sometimes you don't know what

a law is until you break it. Laws are important. They are necessary. But they are so

John 15:5

Our church is the same way. Our laws are important to us, but they are numerous. And they change. It is hard to keep up with them. Couldn't it be simpler somehow?

The First Letter of John says God basically has just two laws. "His commandment is this: we should believe in the name of his Son, Jesus Christ, and love one another just as he commanded us."

There, that was simple. Or was it?

numerous that it's hard to keep track of them all.

To believe in the name of Jesus means that we order our lives around this belief: He is the Son of God, the one who came to save the world. His teaching, ministry and example should shape everything we do. And love one another? Well, that's easy when it comes to people we like. But it's not so easy with people we'd rather ignore, or people who have become our criminal enemies. Loving one another is not so simple.

Whether the laws are many or few, they are hard to keep. But those who keep God's commandments "remain in him, and he in them."

My Sisters and Brothers in Christ:

Peace and Grace of our Lord Jesus Christ be with you this Easter season. St. Peter is filled with the Spirit of the Lord, and we join him, recalling our Baptism, the flow of anointed waters blessing us to bear good fruit for the glory of God's creation. We praise God for His transfiguration of a barren earth into a flourishing garden with the life of humankind, made in the image of God and given dominion over all God's creation.



St. Peter boldly proclaims to the people the core of our belief; that is, Jesus is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. Sometimes it is difficult to "let go and let God," as one saying goes. By the flow of the waters of Baptism, we are called to be God's coredeemers, not only speaking His Word, but actively living as Jesus calls us — to love one another as He loves us. Our greatest success and distress originate with our understanding or lack of understanding about God's creation: God created mankind in His image; "in the image of God He created them; male and female He created them". Knowing and understanding that we are of God changes the conversation for suddenly we are speaking about holiness; about a dwelling place for God and the dissonance between us seems to lift, as a prayer of healing.

Resolution of the dissonance in our daily living is often named, "justice." Our Holy Father tenders that justice is the quintessential social virtue. It is the "moral virtue that consists in the constant and firm will to give their due to God and neighbor". He exhorts us, "Justice is a virtue for the good coexistence of people."

Justice, offered through living the Gospel, establishes sincere relations with others. The righteous person is upright, simple, and straightforward, laid bare as Jesus was on the Cross. He or she does not wear masks or live with deception but speaks the truth. The words 'thank you' are offered because he/ she is indebted to neighbor. The righteous person understands that to love one another means to recognize always that he/she was loved first. He/she lives as a dwelling place of God and understands that each person is born of God. Jesus manifests the infinite love of God who overcomes every limit and every weakness.

Jesus calls us from the Cross to come to Him. He assures us of His everlasting Presence as He is resurrected. He gifts us the nourishment of Himself through the Eucharist. Jesus never tires of us. May we never tire of Him! May we bring Him to one another and infuse the earth with His holy justice
